

Monitoring and Reviewing of Behaviours and Attitudes

As you will be very aware, the school is relentless in its work towards improving our practices so that the children of Claremont have a happy and safe place where they can learn and flourish.

Alongside our reflections, we constantly consider the national picture to help us be balanced, aspirational and realistic. It is a fact that pupil behaviour in schools is changing; anxiety levels have seen an increase in younger and younger children. www.youngminds.org.uk share that one in six children aged five to 16 were identified as having a probable mental health problem in July 2021 which is a huge increase from one in nine in 2017. It equates to five children in every classroom and according to Action for Children, there has been a 50% rise over the last three years. Claremont is no different and we are working daily with individual children and their families to help reduce any anxiety levels. It is challenging as children will feel anxious for many different reasons and what might make one child anxious may not impact another one at all. It is not a one size fits all.

A couple of weeks ago, we shared how we are working together to ensure everyone works on recognising how their own behaviours can affect others, not only for safety, but for children's happiness. Worrying about someone else's approach to us can impact on everyone. What we also recognise is that all children develop emotional intelligence at differing rates. All teachers and adults in the school take time to model expected behaviours and emotional responses; they allow for discussion to ensure the positive culture we have continues.

This is really working well within school times. Our Better Lunchtime approach is becoming more embedded and I am really pleased to share that following recent monitoring and reviewing of our lunchtime playground times, we have seen a 30% reduction in the number of reported incidents over the past month.

We are really keen for this to work at times outside of the school day as well. Unfortunately, we have had an increasing number of complaints from after school club leaders that pupils are not listening or showing respect to them. We believe that the children do not intentionally set out to disrupt the club- they get excited about what they are doing. However, this has resulted in less enjoyment for others and one club has unfortunately decided that they are not able to continue.

We love being able to offer a range of activities and after school clubs to our children and are very keen for this to continue. We would like to ask for your help in supporting the school with this. We ask that you chat with the children about listening and showing respect to the adult running the club, including not shouting, screaming or running inside the school building. Talk with them about the expectations to continue to show kindness to others in the club just as they are expected to do during school time. They may not be aware that it is spoiling the enjoyment and progression of others in the club. Share with them that it may mean they are no longer able to attend that particular club. We would also be grateful if you could support our message to respect school property by asking the children to not climb on the walls and railings at any of our exit points. This is also for their safety.

I would definitely recommend a small chapter book. I know it was written a long time ago, but The Magic Faraway tree is always a hit!




From Miss Newby:




From Mr Hume:

The Maze Runner by James Dashner

Readers are kept on the edge of their seat throughout the entire novel with lots of hidden twists and turns at the end of every chapter. The story is action-packed and similar to watching a film as it is quite fast-paced.

Demon Copperhead by Barbara Kingsolver

This is a powerful modern-day retelling of David Copperfield by Charles
Dickens and was the co-recipient of the 2023 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction, and won the
2023 Women's Prize for Fiction. It's a challenging read and certainly won't suit
everyone but it is also a gripping tale of the trials and tribulations of the protagonist, Demon
Copperhead, born into poverty and a life without choices in the mountains of southern Appalachia.

- Empower your children to take more responsibility for getting ready in the mornings.


The tools we will cover during the workshop can:

Parent Forum: how we support children in English and maths

Tuesday 12th March The event will be held in the school hall. Please enter the school via the gates at the top of the car park.

We will also discuss some of our specialist assessments and interventions where children have more specific barriers to learning.

How is maths used in the real world?

Claremont would like to create a maths display in the school hall that demonstrates how children use their maths skills outside of school. Examples might include the following:

- reading a timetable at a bus stop or train station
- weighing ingredients when cooking
- paying for an item in a shop (with notes and coins)
- moving a piece on a board game
- reading a map
- constructing something with specific measurements
- recording the weather
- measuring how far apart to sow seeds
